Andrea Akers is a master's student in anthropology at Colorado State University, where she has participated in projects working with the Pine Ridge and Cheyenne River Indian Reservations. Her undergraduate honors thesis explores the gendered effects of capitalist incorporation on Pine Ridge households. Her master's thesis focuses on Lakota antisystemic resistance to tourism.

Jane Collins is Professor of Community and Environmental Sociology and Gender and Women's Studies at the University of Wisconsin. Her research on gender and labor has focused on family farms in Peru, the commercial agricultural sector in Brazil, the apparel industry in the United States and Mexico, and the low-wage service sector in the United States. She has published three books and several articles that focus on commodity chains.

Saniye Dedeoglu is Associate Professor of Labor Economics and Industrial Relations at the University of Mugla, Turkey, and has been a Marie Curie Research Fellow at Warwick University, United Kingdom. She is the author or editor of two books. Her research interests are women's industrial work, international labor migration, and the Turkish ethnic economy in Europe.

Wilma A. Dunaway is Professor of Sociology in the School of Public and International Affairs at Virginia Tech. She specializes in world-systems analysis with emphases on the study of sexism, gendered work, households, enslaved families, indigenous peoples, and Appalachia within the modern world-system. She has authored or edited six books and numerous articles and book chapters.

Maria Cecilia Ferolin is associate professor of sociology at Iligan Institute of Technology, Mindanao State University, Philippines. She specializes in global political economy and women in development. She has published several articles in western journals about the state of Philippine fishing households.

Marina Prieto-Carrón is Senior Lecturer in geography at the University of Portsmouth, UK. Since 1997, she has collaborated with the Central American Women's Network, and she works with Latin American women's labor rights groups. Her research is interdisciplinary, encompassing human geography, development, international politics, and gender.

Priti Ramamurthy is Professor and Chair of the Department of Gender, Women, and Sexuality Studies at the University of Washington, Seattle. She is the coauthor of one book and has published numerous articles about feminist commodity chain analysis, the Indian middle class, gender, globalization and agrarian change in India, agricultural biotechnologies, and commodity cultures.

Robert J. S. Ross is Professor of Sociology and Director of the International Studies Stream at Clark University. He is past Chair of the Political Economy of the World-System Section of the American Sociological Association. Nadia Shapkina is Assistant Professor of Sociology at Kansas State University. Her research interests are related to gender, migration, and globalization.
